Genesis 3 set the stage for the first Christmas pageant and now we move to chapter 22 where we see four signs pointing to the coming Christ. Christmas is a continuation of God's redemptive plan—a plan that was in process at the very beginning of time and can be traced throughout the entire Bible.

If ever two suffering people revealed Jesus Christ, it was Abraham and Isaac on Mount Moriah. *Their experience is a picture of the Father and the Son and the cross* and is one of the most beautiful types of Christ found anywhere in the Old Testament. Jesus said to the Jews, "Your father, Abraham, rejoiced to see My day; and he saw it, and was glad" (John 8:56). In Isaac's miraculous birth, Abraham saw the day of Christ's birth; and in Isaac's marriage (Gen. 24), he saw the day of Christ's coming for His bride.
