When Devotion Becomes Duty

Revelation 2:1-7*

Thirty-five years have passed from the end of the letter to the Ephesian church to this passage in Revelation. The state of these Christ-followers in Ephesus stands as a warning to us today that we can be *doing* all the right things but ceasing to *be* the people God has called us to be. It is a subtle transition. We start out rejoicing in our relationship with Jesus Christ, our sin and the weight of our guilt eternally removed. And yet slowly but surely our faith ends up being more ritual than relationship. What begins as a matter of the heart becomes a matter of habit. What was once devotion becomes duty. What was blessing, becomes burden.
